SCALDWELL VILLAGE HALL APPEAL

Following a recent survey of both the external and internal condition of the Village Hall, essential structural repairs have been identified at an estimated cost of some £3,500. Whilst a limited amount of funds are available to undertake some of these repairs it is essential to raise more money over the next few months to enable us to complete the work and undertake subsequent re-decoration.

The Hall is used by a wide cross section of our community who are involved in many of the activities which take place there. These include indoor Bowls, Yoga, Art, Youth Club meetings, Scaldwell Club evenings, Village Social events and private parties. We would like to ask for your help therefore in assisting us to raise the necessary money to ensure your Village Hall is maintained in first class condition.

It is proposed to run a '100' club for which we would like 100 subscribers to pay £1 per fortnight during the period 1 November 1988 - 1 May 1989. Each subscriber will be given a membership number and all numbers will be entered in the fortnightly draw for 3 cash prizes. There will be a bumper prize draw at Christmas to help get the festivities off to a flying start!
