Dear Residents

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION ACT 1990 DOGS (FOULING OF LAND) ACT 1996

It has been brought to my attention that the pavements and grass verges in Scaldwell are being used by an increasing number of dog walkers that are allowing their dogs to foul and are not clearing up their dog's faeces. Not only is this against the law but it is also an unpleasant nuisance and health hazard with children being more at risk. Dog faeces can contain the eggs of the roundworm "Toxocara" which can cause blindness.

I therefore wish to inform all dog owners and dog walkers that under the Council's (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 it is an offence for any person in charge of a dog, which defecates on designated land, to fail, without reasonable excuse to remove any resulting faeces from the land. If you are caught allowing your dog to foul and you fail to clear up after it, the Local Authority could issue an on the spot fine of £50.00, and if taken to Court £1,000 on summary conviction.

I would ask residents to be extra vigilant and if you spot someone allowing their dog to foul and not clearing up after their dog, to report them to me.

If you know someone that persistently commits this offence, please do not be afraid to name and shame by contacting me on the above number, your complaints will be kept confidential.

Cleaning up after your dog is an essential part of your responsibility as a dog owner.

I look forward to helping make your community a cleaner and safer one.

THE SCALDWELL SELECT VESTRY MINUTES BOOK

At the first Select Vestry Meeting on 22nd December 1820 it was decided it would be held once a fortnight on Thursday mornings at 9.00am, starting on 4th January 1821. (The Vestry Meeting was the Social Services of villages. Everyone was allowed to go and this was often unruly, so they became select - only chosen people being allowed to go.) The chief business of the vestry was dealing with the poor and therefore the most important officials were the Overseers of the Poor.

Item. All labourers under the Ticket should come to their work at 8.00am and remain till 5.00pm, being allowed 1 hour for dinner. 4th January 1821

Item. It was ordered that Thompson's girl should be provided with a pair of shoes on her being admitted to the infirmary. 4th January 1821

Item. It was ordered that 10/- a year to be paid to Mr. Watts for a cart road to the gravel pit. 4th January 1821

Item. It was ordered that Jonathan Satchwell should have a letter to be an outpatient in the infirmary and enquiry made of the medical gentleman there concerning his complaint and whether he should have medicine. 1st March 1821

Item. John Chapman should go into the Parish House and pay 1/- a week to the Overseer of the Poor. 1st March 1821.
